It's that time of year - when Project Romania helps the schools

of Communa Seica Mare to buy prizes, and, for some years, have awarded bursaries to the 10 best pupils in the top class to help with the cost of further education in the city schools. For the past 2 years these have been financed by the firm Pyrabalisk, who gave a big donation in



January 2006. Village children only get schooling until they are 14 and many cannot get work after this. However, if they are sponsored to lodge in the city of Sibiu there is opportunity for 'further education', leading to 'Baccalaureate' at 18 yrs for academic pupils and a professional qualification for more practical youngsters. Many children have been sponsored to finish their education and obtain jobs.



In Spring Project Romania gave £500 for 60 families in Buia to have spring water from the hills piped to their yards. The scheme is working well, and the Rainbow Centre benefits from this water too, thanks to the Project Manager.

However, in 2007, many people have said "Surely Romania no longer needs help". Sadly, access to the European Union, far from bringing Utopia, has actually caused hardship in rural areas. This is mainly due to mismanagement at local government level. One sad story is that of our baker, Dan Petri. He had provided the bread for the children of Buia, the small remote village on the edge of the commune. He was told that he would have to cease trading on January 1st as 'his equipment was not up to EU standards'. When Graham Watson heard about it he

said that this was not so - as long as the equipment is cleanable

which it is) Dan could have continued. The contract was given to the other local baker in order to continue the programme Bread4Buia. Graham is looking into this, and other matters. The trustees are very grateful; he is a very busy man.

There was a Times article re EU accession, 'Last Rites for Rustic Romania' www.timesonline.com/europe - put Matau in the search box for 'The village that time forgot'. It's very relevant to Seica Mare too. Also, a John Craven BBC Country File programme about Romania, in which he considered the country to be very suitable for organic farming as it has been pesticide free for many years.

Thus, when in April Florin Benghea was asked to help Buia villagers to sell milk to make "organic" cheese for an Ecological Society sponsored by the Mayor of Sibiu, Klaus Johannis, it seemed good to investigate

the possibility. In June Stephen Zenda, Bill Love, and Dawn Fletcher visited and were impressed with the very fine poly tunnels for cultivation of organic vegetables, set up by an enterprising man who had spent some years in

Italy. They also looked at harvesting local honey using marketing expertise from 'Bees Abroad', an international charity. Catalin Tarnu, who is 18, and his friends harvested 5 tons of honey last year and had to feed most of it to

pigs - for want of a market. This will change... ...

the whole ethos of charity work is changing. These new ideas are very exciting. Instead of just feeding children of destitute families, how much better to give their parents employment and self-respect, and let them provide for their own families. But it needs TIME and EU FUNDING. So, watch this space, and see where God will lead Project Romania next

Until then we will continue to support the poor and disadvantaged in this small community, in whatever way necessary.
